



## **Polytunnel – Grand Opening**

We celebrated our new polytunnel with an official opening ceremony on Wednesday 14th June. The event, attended by Lord Mayor of Oxford - Councillor Lubna Arshad (see speech below), local councillors, school Governors, representatives of the PTA, Eco-Council pupils and staff, gave all those involved in funding and building the tunnel an opportunity to see how it is benefitting pupils in our school. The installation complements existing raised beds and fruit trees donated by Tree Council, Orchards for Schools Project and planted by pupils in the School's Eco Council in 2021. Pupils say "It is great to grow crops that we can eat in school" and "The plants grow better because it is warmer in the polytunnel". The project is also supports our Catholic Social Teaching 'Caring for our Community' and our progress towards the Cafod Live Simply Award which requires us to commit to actions demonstrating that we are living simply, sustainably and in solidarity with the poorest communities.

Brothers and Sisters,

First and foremost, I would like to express my sincere gratitude for inviting me to speak here today as we gather to celebrate the successful completion of the polytunnel project. It is truly a moment of joy and accomplishment for all of us. During my time as the former cabinet member responsible for parks and waste reduction, I had the privilege of working alongside dedicated officers and local councillors who shared a common vision. Together, we joined forces to support St. Joseph's Catholic Primary School in acquiring a polytunnel. I must acknowledge the invaluable contributions of the Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) as well. Through our collaborative efforts, we have successfully realized this goal.

In recent years, it has become increasingly vital to provide the students of St. Joseph's with outdoor learning opportunities. Not only does this help mitigate the transmission of COVID-19, but it also fosters a deeper understanding of the world through hands-on experiences and enables students to work together in groups, interacting with their environment. School gardening, in particular, offers tremendous potential for learning across various subjects, including Science, Maths, English, and Design Technology. Over the past few months, students from all year groups have enthusiastically participated in cultivating vegetables and flowers, constructing raised beds, implementing a water harvesting system, and sowing wildflower seeds.

However, the extended summer holiday and the unpredictable British weather present challenges, restricting what can be grown and harvested outdoors during the school year. Moreover, there is a genuine need for a sheltered outdoor space to conduct activities. The polytunnel we have built provides the perfect solution, offering a protective shelter for groups and creating a valuable growing space that will greatly benefit the school's gardening endeavours in the years to come. This development allows the school to utilize their own produce for meals, cooking lessons, and even potentially sell them to parents throughout the year.

I would also like to express my heartfelt appreciation to all the volunteers who have dedicated their time and effort to make this project possible. Under the exceptional leadership of Ms. Tweedie, their unwavering commitment has brought us to this momentous occasion. I extend my gratitude to everyone involved in erecting the polytunnel, as well as the forest school teachers who demonstrated great resilience during the challenging times of the pandemic, ensuring the completion of this project.

Once again, I would like to convey my immense thanks to all individuals who have contributed to this achievement. I am filled with immense pride, knowing that the generations to come will learn about biodiversity, sustainability, and witness this school taking a lead in climate justice. The presence of Oxford's first polytunnel at St. Joseph's Catholic Primary School serves as a beacon of hope, teaching our children the importance of caring for our planet.

## **E-Safety**

Navigating the world social media, internet and gaming with children and keeping them safe is hard and we recognise this. As a school we pride ourselves on protecting with love all members of our community. We also work to teach children about safe use of the internet through our Ten Ten programme and our Internet safety teaching. During the week after half term, we held our 'Internet Safety Week'. Children attended assemblies with a focus on keeping themselves safe online, with further work in class reinforcing these messages.

When children are exposed to inappropriate language, images and interactions outside of school, they may bring it to school to share. On the 8<sup>th</sup> June we held two sessions for parents to explain to families our approach to this and how our relationships and behaviours policy work. Parents who attended found the sessions very helpful and informative, with a chance to share experiences and approaches. We will send out the materials from these sessions to all parents for future reference.

## **Cricket Tournament – 6<sup>th</sup> June**

Straight after half term, two teams of pupils accompanied me up the hill to a cricket event at Headington School. It was freezing cold but I was glad to see a former pupil organising the event! Some school had dropped out, but both of our teams triumphed in their games against Tyndale School Year 6 boys, one of these games producing a nail-biting finish. Another even closer game was between our own teams – look out cricketing world – we have some great bowlers!


